From the President's Desk: Judy Look

Today is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it.

There is just so much for which to be thankful. On the top of the list should be the three Fs: Faith, Family and Friends. All three probably played a serious part of your Thanksgiving celebrations. If there is one thing that COVID gifts us with is an appreciation of how important the three Fs are in our lives and never to be taken for granted.

For the past several months the League has been there for us. Its outreach connected us as we struggled and continue to struggle with mask wearing, sanitizing, social distancing, and isolation. The ZOOM meetings gave and continue to give the gift of the faces of our sisters with their smiles and laughter as well as an opportunity to learn new technology. Most councils found and continue to find innovative ways to stay connected. Executives developed and continue to develop workshops and programs ready for our in-person meetings. All kinds of prayer and study groups were and continue to be offered so we can nurture our relationship with God and each other. The League also presented and continues to present opportunities to think and get actively involved albeit from home. Some of these opportunities were and are to volunteer for one of the working groups as the strategic plan continues to unfold; to dissect the Welcome Program and see what role members play; to continue with Care for Our Common Home, to study about and write letters on sanctity of life issues and adopt a baby in danger of abortion.

The amendments we received around this time last year require action. The amendments call us to look at the structure of our councils and how they will operate moving forward. It is also a good time to ask why we should be CWL members when we can do all that we do as a woman's group in the parish. Why is it important to be part of a national organization? Is it important to have a voice at the federal level? Is it important for the country to hear the voices of 70,000 plus women express themselves on sanctity of life issues, environmental concerns, human rights of women and children in third world countries and to join with our sisters as we learn how to walk with our indigenous brothers and sisters?

Continuing with the gratitude list is the executive members and spiritual advisors of our parish, diocesan, provincial and national councils. All the work above is due to their hard work. Never have there been so many meetings to discuss, strategize on how to stay connected, pray, and develop programs. Meeting upon meeting trying to work out the best way to meet the needs of their members has occupied much of their time. How can we communicate the amendments; how can we help councils who want to disband; how can we reach our members that are in lockdown in seniors' homes.

How can we make a difference in our members lives?

The final item on the list is you. Look in the mirror and express gratitude for you and your many gifts and talents. Without you there would be no League, no relationships to nurture, no one to laugh and cry with, no one to take life issues to the federal government, no one to study and pray with. Remember you are not a member by chance but a member by invitation. The Lord invited you at your Baptism to become an active member of your faith community and you accepted to do just that when you became a League member.

You, my dear sister is what the League is all about.

Yes ladies, as we sip from our cup of tea and look back there is so much for which to be thankful the gifts of gratitude, faith, hope and love those very gifts upon which we build our future. October is the Month of the Rosary

President Judy Look has invited all to a Rosary Prayer session via ZOOM every Wednesday evening since May 13th, 2020. The invite goes out to all diocesan presidents, usually the Sunday before and in turn is distributed to all council presidents to distribute to their members. The invite is also posted onto the ABMK website. The intention is to pray the rosary every Wednesday while the coronavirus grips our nation and the whole world. Members are invited to send Judy their prayer intentions weekly. Participation so far has varied between 20 to 75 people from all areas of the Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council and from other provinces as well. At the end of the rosary, participates are put into break out rooms for a more personal meet and greet. This is a wonderful way to meet many of our sisters and pray for all in their hours of need. All can participate, you do not need to be a member of the CWL to join.

At the time of this writing, the Rosary would have been prayed over 75 times and will continue to be prayed moving into 2022.

Along with the usual Rosary prayers, prayers to the League, Prayer of St. Joseph, Prayer to St. Michael the Archangel and the Pope's Pandemic Prayer are also recited. All these prayers are available on the ABMK website under the Spiritual Development tab.

Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS June 5th, 2021 Judy Look President's Oral Report



This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it. Today is such a blessing as we gather and see faces of sisters we haven't seen for a while and celebrate the work of so many sisters as we all continue our work for God and Canada. For many of you who know me I subscribe to a philosophy called Three Cups of Tea. It is rooted in the thinking that the first cup of tea is the beginning of a relationship or an idea ...if you decide you like the person or the idea then you move to the second cup which is the time and energy you put in to

discovering who the person truly is or gather information about the idea. Once that process is complete the decision is made to continue with the relationship or idea, and you then begin to sip from the third cup. The first cup is we come as strangers, the second cup we get to know each other and the third is we become family and begin to work with each other to build a relationship or to make the idea happen.

With that in mind two years ago, when I became president of Alberta Mackenzie, I asked the newly elected executive to consider a new focus for the council, a provincial focus and all work accomplished was to be filtered through our relationship with God. The focus of provincial councils has been and is education. But in today's technological world many parishes and diocesan councils are very adept at educating their members as soon as documents, programs and workshops come from National. They have a clear idea of what is happening in their councils and know how to meet the needs of their members. Yes, provincial council plays a role but much more of a support role then the hands on of the past. It was felt that the provincial should include a provincial focus. The provincial officers were asked to focus on four provincial areas that involved the catholic community for there is a need for one strong catholic voice across the province. The four areas identified were catholic education with GrAce (Grateful Advocates of Catholic Education) as the go to group; health with Covenant Health being the catholic arm; the Alberta Sanctity of Life Team whose voice encompasses life from conception to natural death and our indigenous sisters. We made progress on the first three, but we are still sipping from the first cup of tea with our indigenous sisters. That is so regretful as right now with the discovery of the unmarked graves of 215 children it would be such a blessing if a statement could be made on behalf of the whole catholic community of Alberta. We had organized speakers for our provincial convention in Lac La Biche in 2019 to help us get to know our indigenous sisters and possibly develop workable strategies on how to reach out to them. Unfortunately, that convention was cancelled. I do want to express my appreciation to the ladies of St. Paul who had organized it. It was also felt that we should work more closely with the Knights of Columbus as they are the largest catholic men's group in the province. Although we have met with them, we are still on our first cup of tea. So, our work was before us.

All changed when In March 2020 the COVID cup of tea was placed on the table. It was full of surprises of which none were appreciated - social distancing, mask wearing, staying home, churches and businesses shut down. It became impossible to make plans as everything was in flux. Then another cup of tea appeared on the table that of virtual meetings. Many of us slowly sipped from it and began to mull the idea of how they would work. The more we thought about it we felt it could become our friend. So virtual meetings became the norm. But sometimes you can have two much of a good thing. Meetings were being scheduled at all levels for just about everything. It was a real smorgasbord of opportunities from speaker's series, retreats, governance, implementation working groups

not to mention our regular and executive council meetings. Then as I see it a final cup of tea was put on the table identified as COVID Fatigue. Diocesan and parish executives were working overtime to meet everyone's expectations and were being burnt out. A question began to percolate among the membership. If I can't get together with my sisters, why should I be a member? It all boiled down to the Catholic Women's League is about relationships...not virtual ones but physical ones manifested in hugs.

My work in the last six months included meeting with executives, small groups, large groups, governance, workshops, manual reviews, catholic partners and praying the rosary and through it ran a common thread - relationships ... why should anyone want to be a member of the Catholic Women's League or maybe more importantly why am I a member?

I took the opportunity to remind people that being a member of the Catholic Women's League is a privilege, a gift, and a calling. The privilege comes from Baptism where we become part of the family of God. Baptism calls each one of us to tell the world that God Is alive and well not only through our words but our actions. It calls us to repentance, forgiveness, and justice three very important gifts that the world needs. It calls us to love. It is a twofold gift one we give ourselves as we benefit from the companionship of faith filled women and it is a gift to the League as members gifts and talents are a necessity for our councils to thrive. It is a calling because we are not here by chance. God wants us here. He has placed nudges in front of us to encourage us as he knows we are the only one that can do this work. Summed up our membership is about the other. It is about the third world women who need our first world voice through WUWCO and Development and Peace. It is about legislators who need to hear our voice on the sanctity of life, about palliative care patients who know they are still of value and purpose, about the homeless for whom we buy a coffee and make visible, about the unborn child who has an inherent right to life, about the young seminarian who needs support and the retired priest who has nothing but our contributions to live on; about a sister in the League 's daughter who is dying and we lend our support through prayer and funding; about communities devastated by natural disasters and so we open our wallets, about the young woman in our pew who is needing to hear a positive word about her child, about the recently divorced person who needs to know she still belong and it is about the indigenous community that is grieving 215 children whose lives do matter. It is about the other and that other has the face of Christ. There is no room for I or me in the League just we. We who have been given the gifts of the Holy Spirit at our confirmation and celebrated each Pentecost take his voice to the ends of the earth through our membership. This membership is not passive. It requires thinking and work. We have been challenged to get involved in the Catholic Women's League Plans Strategically so our structure will support the work God has given us. If you have studied the Welcome Kit, you will see God written all over it. Be welcoming, care about each other, don't forget the sisters in nursing homes; plan a party to celebrate the members. Our God is a God of Joy, and He expects nothing less from us. If you studied the amendments, you recognized the beginning of the streamlining of our structure so our councils can run more efficiently and not wear out executives. But I want to give a word of caution... We need to be careful that our Blessed Mother does not become a battle ground...we ask her to give us the wisdom to know what is best for the League. We also need to be generous with our funds for if our membership has the power to do all the things, we know it can we also we have to support the organization which means giving a bit more through our membership fees. We are women who effect change because we love one another, and that love needs to radiate to our communities. We are the women of the League who have faced down COVID by changing its meaning from a killer virus to a Catholic Organization full of Vitality, Inspiration and Dedication. Why am I a member because I know that through the power of the Holy Spirit living in me, I can make a difference along with a community of faith filled women who put the needs of others before their own.

In saying all of that when I was at the Mackenzie Ft Smith convention their diocese had just been experiencing the devastating effects of the flooding of the Mackenzie River. Following their convention, I asked their Diocesan President if we could do something as a Provincial Council. She said all need prayers. Further to that she sent me a memo from Bishop Jon Hansen to his parishioners asking for a second collection. Reflecting on this I felt that if this was a normal annual meeting of members and convention the recommendation would be to give one of the mass collections to the diocese. But it is not normal times so I am going to ask the ladies present her if they would direct the money that they would normally give in collection to the Canada Helps donation link at the top of the Diocese of Mackenzie Facebook page at facebook.com/dioceseofmackenzie or send a cheque to the Diocese. As well you could possibly donate from your councils.

As we approach our final year as executives, I ask each one of you to do five things:

Number 1: put on the top of your agendas the letters **AMDG** a Latin acronym for all for the honour and glory of God and refer to it during your meetings to make sure you are on track.

Number 2: place on your agendas a **study time for the Planning Strategically** document and educate your members so they can take ownership of their organization.

Number 3: Encourage all your members to adopt a baby endanger of abortion by naming the child and praying for him or her daily and when we can get together again every person will receive Archbishop Fulton's Sheen prayer card.

Number 4: Bishop McGrattan referred to **Pope Francis encyclical Fratelli Tutti** in his greetings in the annual report book. I encourage all councils study the encyclical. Make it part of your spiritual program at your meetings. *Number 5:* **The final thing is to be grateful**...grateful for being a member of the Catholic Women's League; grateful for the opportunity to serve; grateful for the sisterhood, grateful for being called to build the kingdom of God but most of all be grateful that God loves us and wants us to be his face in our world.

NATIONAL ANNUAL MEETING OF MEMBERS – August 9,10 2021 Submitted by Mary Hunt – President Elect/Organization Chair

Madam President,

As per your request, the following is a summary/highlights of the Business Sessions of the Annual Members Meeting (AMM) on August 9th & August 10th, 2021:

The 100th and 101st National Annual Members Meeting and 2020 Annual Reporting were conducted according to the guidelines set out for all councils in keeping the protection of the health and safety of all in mind. Please note that the decisions to increase annual membership fees and to replace our Patroness, Our Lady of Good Counsel with Our Lady of Guadalupe had been deferred to the National Convention in 2022.

The Minutes of the 1999 National Convention were circulated just prior to the Monday AMM and were adopted as presented.

The Monday Registration Report indicated 45 Alberta-Mackenzie members in attendance.

Two decisions of the national executive that temporarily suspended sections of the Constitution & By-Laws in response to the public health restrictions imposed because of the global pandemic were deferred to 2021 and were ratified. They are as follows:

G.2020.04: Moved by National Officer Margaret Ann Jacobs that national council in national annual meeting of members assembled ratify the decision of the national executive to postpone all 2020 annual meetings of members to immediately precede 2021 national, provincial and diocesan meetings of members, so as to comply as closely as possible with the Canada Not-for-Profit Act's requirement to hold an annual meeting of members and not put the health of the membership at risk. Seconded by Life Member Barbara Jarvis. Adopted.

G.2020.05 Moved by National Officer Margaret Ann Jacobs that national council in national annual meeting of members assembled, ratify the decision of the national executive to make a one-time exception to Part XVI, Section 2(a) of the Constitution & Bylaws to read, "At the parish, diocesan, provincial and national levels, the term of office for elected officers shall by three years", applicable to all officers at all levels at the date of the decision i.e., May 6, 2020. Seconded by Life Member Barbara Thuen. Adopted. Please note that it had been decided last year that if a person had put in her two years and could not do a third year, it is considered that she has completed her term.

Reports were presented by each of the provincial presidents. ABMK Provincial President Judy Look talked about our focus for the coming year which will include our relationship with our Indigenous Sisters & Brothers and Sanctity of Life. She mentioned a new initiative where ABMK councils will be encouraged to "adopt a baby, name the baby and pray for the baby" to reinforce the importance of the Sanctity of Life. Judy reported that Covid Fatigue in addition to a lack of personal connection were two areas the ABMK provincial council would like to address.

The 2025 National Convention will be held in Toronto. A motion was put forward and adopted in response to a letter that had been received from Cardinal Thomas Collins expressing a strong interest by the Diocese of Toronto in hosting the 2025 National Convention. They were to have hosted the 2021 National Convention if it had been held this year.

Some items to note:

- The 2022 National Convention will be held in Kelowna, British Columbia (for the first time it is not Vancouver) from August 13 thru 17 at the Grand Hotel. Convention presentation invited everyone to **Rejoice in the Vineyard of the Lord**.
- Membership statistics for Alberta-Mackenzie are as follows: January 1, 2020: 9,101 December 31, 2020: There were a total of 8,814 members which included 441 new members & 106 deceased members.
- Council statistics for Alberta-Mackenzie are as follows: January 1, 2020: 155 councils December 31, 2020: 150 councils [3 councils were unpaid and 2 councils had disbanded].
- It was announced that the 1% voluntary fund for Canadian Catholic Organization for Development and Peace was reinstated in September 2020.
- An annual day of prayer for Christians in the Holy Land was initiated for September 21st.
- Discussions with regard to Honorary Life members are on-going.
- The implementation Strategic Plan continues to move forward and an excellent presentation was shown reporting the progress of the various Working Groups. It was gratifying to see that a number of Alberta-Mackenzie members had volunteered to serve in the Working Groups and contribute to determining the future of the League.
- The National Bursary will be awarded to six qualifying applicants. Each will receive \$6,912.00. The Alberta Mackenzie recipient is Pamela Benko from Holy Trinity Parish in Spruce Grove . It was noted that one council in Alberta Mackenzie initiated their own bursary for a graduate who exemplified the pillars of faith, service and social justice.
- A review of the 2020 audited financial statements was provided.
- Resolutions discussion around approval of resolutions to be archived.
- League Magazine As a cost-saving measure, the National Executive has on a trial basis decided to provide only an electronic version of the Fall League Magazine rather than a paper copy to League members. The Winter edition will be a paper copy mailout.

Greetings from Your President-Elect – Mary Hunt

Greetings Sisters in the League,

We are reminded that...



Our global family continues to be challenged by COVID amid the fears and isolation it has introduced into our lives. We all hope and long for a return to the life we enjoyed before the pandemic and took for granted where gatherings, travel and universal medical care was available in a system not so heavily burdened. When we count our blessings, membership in the Catholic Women's League should be included and it a blessing that we are encouraged to share with others.

It is meaningful to know that our shared **faith** and membership in the League provides us with opportunities to be spiritually blessed as we strive to unite with other Catholic women in a sisterhood whose goal is to further our **Catholic faith**, cultural and intellectual interests and to develop **service** opportunities to promote **social justice** through action.

Being a member means discovery, confidence, personal skills development, and provides opportunities to share one's talents along with other League sisters comprised of both old and new friends and having the privilege of helping others while growing through faith opportunities such as our weekly ABMK rosary.

During the past 18 months, membership numbers in the League have declined in many of our councils and sadly that decline has contributed to the potential disbanding of 6 councils in Alberta Mackenzie. Neighboring councils are encouraged to connect with members who are left without a council and invite them to one of your meetings, so they know they have a place to belong and are welcome.

Not all councils experienced losses, as was witnessed in councils applying for the **2020 Walter Krewski Annual Membership awards**. Several councils saw increases notably including St. John Bosco in Edmonton and St. Mary's Cathedral in Calgary. When asked, St. Mary's President, Sharon Bernard cited the offering by their council of new online faith opportunities as a contributing to their growth which included online bible study as well as spiritual retreats that were publicized in the Parish bulletin and through personal invitation. St. John Bosco's ability to attract young women to join holds future promise for their council. Application forms for the 2021 Walter Krewski Awards will be available on the provincial website starting November 1st. Additional information and forms will be emailed to councils in late November. Councils may want to take this "slower pandemic time" to increase their knowledge of the League so that they may be inspired and renewed for the important work that lays before us. Some useful tools we have been given are the *Welcome Program*, the *Executive Orientation Program* and the newly released *videos* which promote the League and serve to dispel some of the possible misconceptions held in our parishes, even by our clergy.

A video introducing the *Welcome Program* is found at <u>https://cwl.ca/welcome-program-video/</u> This resource is found at http://www.cwlsk.ca/extras/Welcome-Program-(2020).pdf "This program is intended to assist you as you welcome members to your parish council and to encourage the involvement of all members. You spoke, and you were heard. Best practices and great ideas were researched from councils and external organizations. Included in this program are suggestions, ideas and resources for you to adapt and customize to use in ways that will work best for your council. Remember welcoming is not a one-time event. It is a continuous process and mindset that touches members on an ongoing basis. It is what will help members to feel that they are genuinely connected and part of the organization".

The *Executive Orientation Program* was introduced in early June and is available on the national website: <u>https://cwl.ca/executive-orientation/</u>. The program consists of 10 modules that provide an introduction/refresher to various aspects of the League including:

- 1. History of the League
- 2. Structure of the League and the Promise of the League
- 3. Core Principles; Constitution & Bylaws; Policy and Procedure; Executive Handbook
- 4. Duties of Officers
- 5. Life & Honorary Life Membership
- 6. Strategic Plan Summary
- 7. Communication
- 8. Budgets
- 9. Member Recognition
- 10. Public Presence and Member Development

Councils are encouraged to view these modules at either executive meetings or general meetings as they serve as a great learning tool. It may be best to show one module at a time.

In March of 2020, as the devastation of the pandemic began to impact the world, it was hard to imagine that months later, the world would continue to experience the ravages of this same pandemic. And yet here we are!

The risk and the effects of a global pandemic may have eluded our consciousness given the reassurance of living in a country with a world class healthcare system. However, as the professionals and staff of our healthcare systems continue to

provide extraordinary and dedicated medical care service, we have also become aware of the fragility of our collective and our individual health. Some people are growing weary of the health precautions and others are mourning the deaths of family members or friends. It is an anxious time and sometimes, we see this anxiety spill over into frustration, anger, a complacency or an indifference that is promoted by individualism and the disregard for others in favor of freedom and personal rights.

This pandemic has been with us for a long while and it isn't under control and nor is it over yet. In the face of such uncertainty it is sometimes difficult even to awaken feelings of excited anticipation when so many plans have been changed or cancelled. We are living in a time of "perhaps" and "maybe it is possible." Perhaps it may happen...

As the pandemic impacts our everyday lives, it also has had an even greater impact upon the healthcare system. In a recent article, Dr. Helen Reiss MD reflected on the fundamentals that have sustained the healthcare system through this crisis and the following summarizes her findings, "*The best way to be resilient when crises strike is by viewing the healthcare professionals through the lens of empathy. Institutional values of safety, access to accurate and caring information, human connection, and emphasis on mental health, are hallmarks of resilient organizations and will result in resilient individuals.*"

Dr. Reiss' two points from her study on the resilience of the healthcare system are helpful for our own self-reflection as we continue to face this pandemic.

First, each person is created in the image of God and deserving of the empathy we should demonstrate toward one another. A friend recently showed me a Facebook post that read, "You know who's going through a lot right now? <u>Literally everyone</u>. Just be kind." This is true. Each person is finding a way to carry the burdens and the Cross which this pandemic has brought into their lives. The "lens of empathy" Dr. Reiss describes as being a true sign of charity and one that we are called in these challenging times to extend to one another.

Second, Dr. Reiss highlights the importance of institutions and organizations for the support of individuals – and in particular for the role of promoting and protecting **human connection**. Organizations with a common purpose such as the Catholic Women's League are critical for the support of one another as individuals. When I was invited to write this message for the Fall newsletter,

Judy Look told me that she had made a new acronym for COVID - Catholic Organization full of Vitality, Inspiration and Dedication. This re-scripting of the virus' acronym invites us to consider a new way of thinking during this pandemic – full of vitality, inspiration, and dedication.

In the Book of Acts, Luke describes the first community of believers in similar words,

"Awe came upon everyone, because many wonders and signs were being done by the apostles. All who believed were together and had all things in common; they would sell their possessions and goods and distribute the proceeds to all, as any had need. Day by day, as they spent much time together in the temple, they broke bread at home and ate their food with glad and generous hearts, praising God and having the goodwill of all the people. And day by day the Lord added to their number those who were being saved." (Acts 2:43-47)

The vitality of the risen Christ was present when they gathered in community, in their human connection to one another, it was the Holy Spirit who inspired them to see in through the eyes of faith and directed their hearts to promoting the common good. It is this image of supporting one another in the faith and sharing with one another the joys and trials of life which fosters the strength and the resilience of the faith community. This description also points towards a hopeful future where others, who see in this witness the love and goodness of God, will join with the mission.

For the members of the Catholic Women's League, I encourage you to persevere in your resilience and dedication to good works and prayers. I also invite you to reach out to one another. The kindnesses shown to the other will shine brightly during this pandemic, for sure, and also promote the vitality, inspiration and dedication to your continued mission in the Church.

May our God who calls you to this service and witness in the Church and Canada sustain you with His Love and Grace.

Greetings from Your Resolutions and Legislation Chair – Betsy Fletcher

Due to the tragic loss of our Sharon Malec, our Legislation Standing Committee Chair, I will be assuming her position for the rest of this term, as well as filling my position of Resolutions.



In keeping with Strategic planning, perhaps it's time to examine where we

are with regard to resolutions and legislation and the three pillars. Do we fall under faith, how about service, or maybe social justice? It only makes sense that we would fit under all three.

Let's start with faith. Everything we do under the umbrella of the Catholic Women's League of Canada begins with faith. We are informed by our faith. With faith, we love our neighbours. With faith, we can move mountains.

Do our resolutions and legislation studies reflect service to our fellow citizens? We'll use archived resolution 2008.03: Toxic Substances in Household Products, as an example of service. How many of us were truly aware of how toxic some of our household products were to us? We probably noticed the skull and crossbones on our bleach, but we used it anyway. How about that nifty skeletal hand in the bucket? It indicated the product could be corrosive, but some of us would use those products without rubber gloves on our hands. Our resolution urged the federal government to prohibit the use of suspected toxic substances and to require adequate warning labels. The government did address this issue.

Now we come to social justice. Social justice is not about making sure a convicted criminal goes to jail for a long time for his crimes. It's about making sure the people in our country do not get left behind because of poverty, racism, sexism, ageism, human rights, et cetera. Legislation research helps us to determine if a resolution should be pursued. Resolution 2019.01: Canada to Honour its Commitment to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child is one resolution that truly reflects the need for the resolution and the need for legislation to be enacted. This resolution came about because while Canada did ratify this Convention, it did not fully sign on. Changes in legislation were made to make life better for Children in Canada.

Joining the Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council in 2017 she first served as Resolution chair and then in 2019, Legislation chair. She took her duties diligently and faithfully. Working with other chairs of the ABMK Council, she

presented a full provincial council charge on Bill C-7, encouraging all councils to email, write and call their MPs and others on this very serious and ethically charged Bill.

Sharon served on the Calgary Diocesan Council from 2007 to 2019, becoming president in 2015 (2015-2017). Of all the chairs she held, I am sure she enjoyed the Spiritual one the most. Here her love of God, the Church and the League really shone through. Sharon created several prayers including a Stole Liturgy, used when presenting a CWL stole to a Spiritual Advisor and a Quilt Blessing Service in 2017 along with Betty Anne Brown Davidson, a past National President. As Liturgy Committee Chair for the National 2019 CWL convention held in Calgary, August 2019, she worked closely with the National Spiritual Chair and the National Spiritual Advisor to develop a thoughtful and spiritually powerful program. She also quilted a beautiful Madonna and Child banner for the National 2019 Prayer Room, as shown here.

Sharon loved The League – she was excited about the National Strategic Plan to move the League forward for the next 100 years. She was part of the

National Implementation Committee – Working Group #3 – Spiritual Formation – developing a program to help councils and members create their own original prayers and spiritual programs. *I look forward to using the prayers that the National committee has created, knowing that Sharon was a part of this.*

Sharon loved to quilt and many have been recipients of her sewing ability from quilts, wall hangings, pencil holders, tea bag wallets, tissue holders and Christmas decorations - all sewn and given with love and care. When



I consulted her on what parting gift she would like to receive as she transitioned from president to past president for the Calgary Diocesan Council, she suggested "fat quarters". For all of you non-quilters this was a challenge! First of all, we had to figure out what "fat quarters" were and


Federal Election: Unfortunately, when the Federal Election was called all bills have died on the order paper including:

<u>Bill S-216 – Modern Slavery Act</u> Sponsor: Senator Miville-Dechêne <u>Bill S-203 - Protecting Young Persons from Exposure to Pornography Act</u> Sponsor: Senator Miville-Dechêne <u>Bill C-302 – Stopping Internet Sexual Exploitation (SISE) Act</u> Sponsor: MP Arnold Viersen

The good news is that three co-chairs of the All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) to End Modern Slavery and Human Trafficking, Liberal MP John McKay, Bloc MP Andréanne Larouche, and Arnold Viersen were re-elected in this past election. As Senators are appointed, our fourth co-chair, Senator Julie Miville-Dechêne also continues in her role. This group look forward to continuing to raise awareness among Parliamentarians and advance policies to end exploitation and to bring all these bills back onto the floor as soon as possible.

Sisters in the League:

What a year 2021 has been. We have experienced all kinds of twists and turns, but we seem to have made the best of it, keeping our families and friends safe by masking, social distancing and getting our vaccine shots. The work we have done in the last 19months, amid upending events and uncertainty, has solidified our faith in God and commitment to the CWL.

The Edmonton Diocesan Council held its 2021 Fall Meeting on October 2nd. We opened our meeting with a prayer for reconciliation and solidarity with Indigenous Peoples following Canada's first Truth and Reconciliation Day. Our guest speaker for the meeting was Fr. Soosai Jesu OMI, Pastor of Sacred Heart Catholic Church of the First Peoples. His presentation was "Building a Relationship with Sacred Heart Parish of the First Peoples". This parish has a unique role in the archdiocese incorporating indigenous teaching, symbols, ceremonies, Catholic scriptures and customs reflecting a coming together of both traditions. Fr Soosai also outlined the vision of Sacred Heart Church to be a most loving and welcoming place by promoting Calls to Action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission. He shared how this vision will be accomplished through the liturgical ministries as well as supporting the materially and spiritually poor, the homeless and the marginalized with their varied needs. Following the presentation, CWL members discussed way to support the parish and how to participate in the rebuilding project.

To maintain our relationships with our schools and provide resources to the school library, a **CWL Book Project** was launched. Each council was asked to donate a book to an elementary school beginning during Read in Week commencing October 4th with the theme "*To Each Their Own Story*" and concluding on Education Sunday November 6th. We will begin the project with a donation to the elementary schools by gifting the book "*Everybody's Welcome*" by Patricia Hegarty to be followed in January with books selected for junior and high school libraries.

Edmonton Diocesan Council will be hosting a Compassionate Community Care Workshop: *Being With - Volunteer Training* on Saturday, October 23rd at 10:00 a.m. The speakers for the workshop are Genevieve Schadenberg, Director of Compassionate Community Care, Alex Schadenberg, Executive Director of the Euthanasia Prevention Coalition, and Kathy Costa. Information to register is on the Edmonton Diocesan website: <u>www.edmontoncwl.ca</u>. There is no cost to attend the workshop but registration is limited to 100 people. Membership continues to be a concern. Our membership at the end of August 2021 was at 3,574, down about 650 members from 2020. In the past year we have had five councils indicate they have either disbanded or were in the process of disbanding. However, Diocesan Council has heard from parishes that either wish to reactivate or start a new council. One such example is Sacred Heart Catholic Parish of the First Peoples. Sacred Heart Parish had been one of the original parishes that met in 1912 to begin the CWL in Edmonton. We are excited to able to welcome them back to the Diocesan Council. The installation of executive will take place in January 2022.

The 2022 Mid-Winter workshops will be held on Saturday, January 23rd and Saturday, January 29th. It is hoped these workshops can be in person but an online workshop will be planned as back up. We are looking forward to implementing the new national theme: Catholic and Living It!

Planning is underway for the 100th Annual Convention, to be held in Camrose April 29, 30 & May 1st, 2022. We are looking forward to being able to gather in person. We will be celebrating the recognition of council anniversaries, looking back over 100 conventions, recognize deceased members, retire the banners of disbanded councils, and most importantly have the election of Diocesan Officers for 2022 to 2024 term!

Edmonton Diocese was fortunate to have three members elected to the National CWL Board, Fran Lucas, National President, Cathy Bouchard, 2nd Vice President and Spiritual Development Standing Committee and Dorothy Johansen, Christian Family Life Standing Committee. We offer our prayers and congratulations to them for their work for God and Canada.

I close by reminding us with words of Joshua 1:9, "...Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

Greetings on behalf of the Calgary Diocesan Council.

We are entering our 100th year as a Diocesan Council and even though we continue to live through the pandemic, our councils are alive and well. We are proud of the accomplishments of our diocese as our 47 councils celebrate a century of

service. Our success is attributed to generations of faith filled, dedicated women (moms, daughters, sisters, and grandmothers) who joyfully serve their parish, community and country.

One of the positives COVID-19 has brought us is how we can reach out through technology. Councils throughout the diocese offered bible studies, weekly rosary, prayer evenings, and year end celebrations, inviting members from all over the diocese to take part. What a wonderful way for us to celebrate our sisterhood.

We started out the year with a virtual three part *Laudato Si'* workshop facilitated by Jeannette Nixon of St. Patrick's council in Calgary and Diocesan Officer Kathleen Winter. We are very grateful to these ladies for sharing of their gifts and helping us to embrace our third core value of "social justice". Members from all levels of the League joined us, with over 60 in attendance each week. We were provided with many ways we can carry out our theme "*Care for Our Common Home – Stewards of Creation*"

Also in January, we welcomed our new Diocesan Spiritual Advisor Father Pilmaikén Lezano, who was ordained a priest in 2015 and brings a youthful energy to our diocesan council. When Bishop McGrattan officially installed Father Pilmaikén at our Annual Meeting of Members, the Bishop indicated it was the first time he had ever installed anyone virtually before, but it was a beautiful and spiritual ceremony none the less. Father Pilmaikén has provided a virtual Lenten Retreat, as well as inspiring and touching spiritual reflections.



Members remained active and engaged as they became techies. They became creative in their fundraising efforts, such as take-out meals, flower and chocolate sales, sales of fair trade products, cookie walks, and even a Valentine fundraiser called "Sweets for the Sweet". These fundraisers allowed them to continue to support their favored charities.

Many virtual meetings took place with our Diocesan Convention Planning Committee in the hopes that we'd be able to have an in person convention, however God had other plans, and on Saturday, May 1st we held our virtual Annual Meeting of Members with approximately 100 members in attendance. Congratulations to St. Mary's Cathedral Council in Calgary who were the recipients of the Walter Krewski Award for the largest percentage increase in members for 2020. These ladies have become a real presence at the Cathedral, and their council grew by 29% even amidst a pandemic.

Diocesan President-Elect Renee Spohn introduced the Welcome Program to our members through various workshops as well as the Companionship program at Regional Meetings. Before we broke for the summer, an event was held to validate our members, and everyone in attendance had a wonderful evening.

Sadly, we lost our sister Sharon Malec on Sunday August 8th. Sharon was Calgary Diocesan President from 2015 – 2017, was very involved in the 99th National CWL Convention held in Calgary in August of 2019, and her input in the Spiritual Formation Working Group of the implementation committee of the strategic plan will be her legacy. Approximately 50 members from all over the Calgary Diocese honoured Sharon by attending her prayer service in Lethbridge on Friday, August 13th.



The next day, Saturday, August 14th, many members then travelled to St. Mary's in Brooks for Carol Schlachter's Memorial Mass. Just prior to her passing at the beginning of the pandemic, Carol had been honoured with a Life Membership to the League, and although she didn't ever get to wear her pin, her husband Andy wore the pin on the inside of his suit jacket, next to his heart.

The gut-wrenching news of the finding of unmarked graves of indigenous children at residential schools shocked us all, and we are grateful to Bishop McGrattan for the work he is doing in the Diocese of Calgary to reach out to our indigenous brothers and sisters to assist them in Justice, Healing and Reconciliation. At our recent Diocesan Fall Meeting he shared a presentation with members of the Calgary Diocese, and responded to numerous questions.




Fall is such a season of thanksgiving – for another harvest completed, for the goodness from our gardens, for the beauty of our landscape dressed in autumn colour, and for the family and friends we are able to share all of this with. Truly we are blessed by God! I am so thankful for these blessings, and for the wonderful support of our members.

All three regular Diocesan meetings were held by Zoom in 2021, and it was wonderful to be able to see each other virtually. While I am so grateful for the technology that makes this possible, I remain mindful of the fact that it is not universally available, and that we must not forget nor leave behind our sisters who are unable, for many different reasons, to connect in this way. There was a time in our history when the telephone was new, and began slowly replacing letters and a knock at the door, so I think we are experiencing a similar transition – making use of the new while continuing to be sisters to each other and the community at large with a good old phone call, letter or card in the mail, or a knock at the door when and where this is possible.

We very regretfully accepted the decision of the ladies of St. Theresa's CWL Council of Breynat, who voted to disband this past summer. Membership in our Diocese for 2021 currently stands at 463, down from 554 in 2020.

At the end of June the parish of Morinville experienced the loss of the historic and beautiful church of St. Jean Baptiste due to fire. So we find ourselves with a new opportunity for prayer, for forgiveness, and for working together to build anew a place where, to paraphrase what our bishop said, our ancestors and elders all came as brothers and sisters in Christ to pray and to listen to Jesus.





Bishop Paul Terrio was able to join us for a portion of our Fall Diocesan meeting and presented updates on Morinville parish, the Diocesan Caritas, an upcoming ordination, and the results of the meeting of parish clergy and representatives from Indigenous parishes in our Diocese.

As Catholic Women's League members we will look for ways we can support and contribute to these efforts. In spite of the challenges, the ladies of the Catholic Women's League here in the Diocese of St. Paul have done their best to carry out their mission of growing in faith and witnessing to the love of God through ministry and service. As restrictions eased over the summer, a number of in-person memorials, welcome lunches, and fundraising activities were held. Inspired councils adopted and adapted new methods of fundraising like the bakeless bake sales, which allowed them to continue their

support of many different charities, shelters, school graduates and school programs, clothing drives, and other local services in their areas while still following the evolving government guidelines. Plans are underway throughout the Diocese to continue with fall activities such as winter wear clothing collections, Operation Christmas Child, Food Bank and Santa's Anonymous.
