UPDATE August 2018

The Catholic Women's League has been involved in planning strategically for the future of the League.

This process involves knowledge-based decision-making to align League activities with the core purpose, values and goals members have for the future.

The first step in planning for the future was to assess if the League was still relevant in today's church and society. The answer, of course, was a resounding YES!

Yes, the League has a place today, perhaps even more so than ever before!

Once this most important question was answered, the steering committee and the board turned its attention to articulating three core guiding principles - what the League is, what values it holds and what its mission is.

Core Purpose: Why does the League exist? What activities should it undertake?

CORE PURPOSE

Uniting Catholic women to grow in faith, and to promote social justice through service to the church, Canada and the world

Core Values: The fundamental beliefs dictate the behavior of all members in the pursuit of the League's purpose and the enduring truths about what the League stands for:

CORE VALUES

FAITH - following Catholic teaching

SERVICE - local, national and international

SOCIAL JUSTICE - actively involved in society

Mission Statement: The scope of the League's operations and how it is accomplished - The mission statement we all know and love is still relevant, but the wording has been modernized. It now reads:

At the national convention August 2018, a Frame of Reference for a fiveyear plan was presented that encompassed all levels of the League.

The next step is the formation of an implementation committee that will be charged with making the goals a reality.

The committee will become active immediately upon selection and will dissolve upon full implementation of the strategic plan or March 31, 2023, whichever comes first.

The steering committee has worked diligently to outline what will be done in the next five years to assure a continued and more vibrant national organization. The implementation committee will choose how the strategies will come alive for all parishes.

- † reports from executive members and standing committee chairs that have been sent to you ahead of the meeting.



Development & Peace Update

I will attempt to bring our members up to date on the investigative process that has been taking place since November of 2017 regarding the allegations that some of D & P's partners are making decisions in contradiction to our faith convictions as Catholics. At National Convention it was apparent to me, given the large number of questions asked, that our ladies are very concerned with this – particularly from the perspective of all the poor who have been affected by the decision to halt ALL transfers of funds to ALL partners for what has turned out to be the better part of a year at this point.

One of the keynote speakers at the spring Western Assembly for Development & Peace was Christian Champigny. He is the International Programs Department Deputy and gave an overview of International Programming at D & P.

Criteria around which decisions are made to partner or not, include dignity and respect for life and equality of persons, a preferential option for the poor, a quest for the common good, care of God's creation and the nurturing of solidarity, subsidiarity and inter-reliance. The projects fall into two main areas: long-term development (see Pope Francis Village in the Philippines) and Humanitarian Response to crises.

He also gave a very detailed history around the recent concerns about some of D & P's partners.

March/April 2017 the Bishops were contacted by D & P to tell them "All is well." The Bishops initiated a review by striking a committee of eight: four from D & P, four staff

from the CCCB. This group met for the first time in November of 2017 and began to address questions like "What are the criteria? What does it mean to work against Church teachings? And what is the "degree of evilness"? The work of this group was supposed to have been confidential, but in January the list of partners "in Question" was shared with the Bishops who did their own analysis which at that point was basically a "Google" search. D & P began to do their own verification and made categories from serious to minimal concern.

Christian Champigny clearly stated that D & P sent NO money to projects that have anti-Catholic priorities. D & P does NOT partner with organizations that have an agenda/mandate to e.g. provide access to safe abortions etc.



Christian asked a most interesting question around the process of investigating partners and projects that I think bears repeating: "If a local bishop supports a project, does that mean we stop asking questions?" Some of the groups presently being targeted are actually working with local Bishops. Just because we're partners in a network doesn't mean we have to support everything in a group that is part of that network. This statement resulted in accusations made by "LifeSite" in 2009 that were false – and I might add, are still posted on their web site as fact. No apology or retraction was made following the investigation by the CCCB which proved the accusations false. It is deeply disturbing that EVERY partner has had their funds withheld based on unproven accusations. The reputation of this stellar organization has again been dragged through the mud and innocent vulnerable people who need our help are suffering.

At National convention, Bishop McGrattan very graciously responded to all questions raised by attendees. I was able to have a private conversation with him following this convention session where he again responded to my questions. He indicated his strong support for D & P and expressed his grief that this situation has developed. He sees the process as one of "purifying" and evolving to make D & P a more accountable, stronger, better organized, more transparent organization. He remains hopeful that the investigation is close to its conclusion and that the fall Bishops Assembly will result in the conclusion of the process which will then result in all funds being transferred to the remaining partners.



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Ladies, I have so much good news to share that reflects the advocacy work that our League continues to do in support of those with no voice!

Community Life

NATIONAL PALLIATIVE CARE FRAMEWORK:

On December 12, 2017 assent was given to Bill C-277, An Act providing for the development of a framework on palliative care in Canada. This enactment provides for the development of a framework designed to support improved access for Canadians to palliative care. Carter v. Canada emphasizes the importance of palliative care in the context of physician-assisted dying; Whereas the Final Report stated that a request for physician-assisted death cannot be truly voluntary if the option of proper palliative care is not available to alleviate a person's suffering; the Parliament of Canada recognizes the importance of ensuring that all Canadians have access to high-quality palliative care, especially in the context of physician-assisted death;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate and House of Commons of Canada, enacts as follows:

The Minister of Health must, in consultation with the representatives of the provincial and territorial governments responsible for health, as well as with palliative care providers, develop a framework designed to support improved access for Canadians to palliative care — provided through hospitals, home care, long-term care facilities and residential hospices — that, among other things,

- (a) defines what palliative care is;
- (b) identifies the palliative care training and education needs of health care providers as well as other caregivers;
- (c) identifies measures to support palliative care providers;
- (d) promotes research and the collection of data on palliative care;
- (e) identifies measures to facilitate a consistent access to palliative care across Canada:
- (f) takes into consideration existing palliative care frameworks, strategies and best practices; and
- (g) evaluates the advisability of re-establishing the Department of Health's Secretariat on Palliative and End-of-Life Care.

The Minister of Health must prepare a report setting out the framework on palliative care and cause the report to be laid before each House of Parliament within one year after the day on which this Act comes into force.

Resolution 2016.04 to amend the Canada Health Act to Identify Palliative Care as an Insured Health Service is directly related to this legislation and is strengthened as the result of this new law.

CLOSING THE CIRCLE ON PROTECTION OF ALL LIFE:

Death penalty always 'inadmissible,' Catholic Church says, updating doctrine"

Pope Francis has changed Catholic Church teaching about the death penalty, saying in a new policy published Thursday that it is always "inadmissible" because it "attacks" the inherent dignity of all humans.

The Vatican said Francis had approved a change to the Catechism of the Catholic Church — the compilation of official Catholic teaching. Previously, the catechism said the church didn't exclude recourse to capital punishment "if this is the only possible way of effectively defending human lives against the unjust aggressor."

The new teaching, contained in Catechism No. 2267, says the previous policy is outdated, that there are other ways to protect the common good and that the church should instead commit itself to working to end capital punishment."


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

2018.03 Legislate Designation of Hospice/Palliative Care Services in Facilities to Exclude Medical Assistance in Dying.

The **Euthanasia Prevention Coalition** continues to encourage Canadians to sign **The Declaration of Hope** which strongly asserts that legalizing euthanasia and/or assisted suicide is bad public policy. The declaration supports the CWL's belief that all Canadians should have equal access to quality pain control; no matter where they live. We are encouraged to purchase the **Fatal Flaws** DVD and the **Caring Not Killing Pamphlet** and the **Shedding Light on Assisted Suicide in America Pamphlet**



The Coalition for HealthCare and Conscience encourage Alberta/Mackenzie residents to write to their MLAs and provide the following example for a letter campaign:

Dear MLA.

I am writing to ask you to support the creation of pro-conscience legislation in our province like Bill 34 - the Medical Assistance in Dying (Protection for Health Professionals & Others) Act, which passed in Manitoba in November, 2017. Such legislation would protect Alberta health care professionals from having to act against their conscience. It would make participation in assisted suicide voluntary and would overrule the policies of regulatory bodies should they ever require doctors, nurses and other health professionals to participate in Medical Assistance in Dying. I agree that no one should be forced to participate, either directly or indirectly, in the process of ending a patient's life. This includes by making a referral. No one should be discriminated against because of their stand. Please take whatever legislative steps are required to ensure that no one is forced to participate in assisted suicide. Thank you.



This summer my husband and I were blessed to attend the World Meeting of Families in Dublin, Ireland from August 21-26. We attended sessions on Handing on the Faith in the Home Today; Handing on the Faith



between the Generations: The Role of Grandparents; The Family: A Resource for Society; The Dignity and Beauty of Sexual Love: Finding New Language for Ancient Truths; Turning Technology to the Greater Good: Faith, Family & Technology; Pope Francis on the Gospel of the Family: What is Jesus Calling our Families to be?; and Glued to Our Phones: Can Technology become more Family Friendly?

Each day consisted of multiple options for speakers and panel sessions in the morning, and then afternoons in the "Family Arena" with a keynote speaker, testimonials from families from all over the world, and the celebration of the Holy Eucharist in the afternoon. There were evening programs and

an exhibit hall with vendors and religious communities from all over Ireland and the world displaying their information. We were blessed to have Pope Francis attend the Saturday "Festival of Families" and say mass for half a million people in Phoenix Park on Sunday.




September 14-16, 2018, the provincial executive of the CWL finalized the priorities for the next meeting with the provincial and territorial governments:

- 1. **ABMK Provincial Resolution 2018.01** to urge the provincial and territorial governments to officially recognize obesity as a chronic disease.
- 2. **National Resolution 2018.03** to bring concerns regarding the protection of health care providers' conscience rights and urge the government to legislate that protection.
- 3. To ask that the government take action to alleviate the inequities regarding the availability of mental health services in rural Alberta, and
- 4. To remind the provincial government that the Catholic Women's League are lobbying to have the Seniors Advocate Office independent of the government.

The office of the Premier of Alberta, Rachel Notley and the office of the Premier of the Northwest Territories, Bob McLeod have been contacted initially asking for a meeting at their convenience. The plan is to have our President, Education and Health Committee Chair, Resolutions Committee Chair and Legislation Committee Chair attend the meetings with the premiers. Follow up communications will occur and it is hoped that a meeting will be held with these officials before Christmas of this year.

In the meantime, members of the Alberta Mackenzie Catholic Women's League continue to work for God and Canada. Members are urged to follow the action plans of the National organization with regards to the resolutions that have been passed both at National and Provincial levels.

2018.02 Setting a Standard for products Marketed as Flushable

Resolved, that national council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada in 98th annual national convention assembled urge the federal government to establish a national standard of testing and labelling of products marketed as "flushable"; and be it further **Resolved,** that this resolution be forwarded through the national executive to the provincial councils, encouraging them to become aware of this issue as it pertains to their province/territory, and to act on it, as deemed necessary/prudent.

2018.03 Legislate Designation of Hospice/Palliative Care Services in Facilities to Exclude Medical Assistance in Dying

Resolved, that national council of The Catholic Women's League of Canada in 98th annual national convention assembled urge the federal government to legislate the designation of hospice/palliative care services in facilities to exclude medical assistance in dying; and, be it further

Resolved, that this resolution be forwarded through the national executive to the provincial councils, encouraging them to become aware of this issue as it pertains to their province/territory, and to act on it, as deemed necessary/prudent.





"A Woman's Voice: Conversations of Discernment and Grace" was released on Easter Sunday by Salt and Light Catholic Media Foundation, and profiles 11 different Catholic women around the globe in their various capacities as mothers, diocesan chancellors, teachers, nuns, lawyers, and chief executive officers.

According to Father Thomas Rosica, CEO of Salt and Light, the Easter release was an intentional effort to highlight the role of women as the first witnesses to Christ's Resurrection.

"Anyone who thinks that the early Church invented its accounts of the resurrection must ask themselves why the Gospels all insist on telling the story of the women who were the first witnesses," Rosica said in a statement. "What was once believed to be 'idle tales' is now a bold, transparent testimony to the resurrection with real historical credibility."

"Today, the Church still struggles to give women their due voice as witnesses to our risen life in Christ. Pope Francis has invited the Church to develop a deeper theology of women," Rosica continued. "I sincerely hope that this documentary is a small, yet effective response to the pope's invitation to the whole Church to give women a voice and recognize their tremendous witness in the world."

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ABMK Goes to National Convention





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98th Annual CWL National Convention: Highlights – Winnipeg August 11-15 Submitted by Judy Look, President-Elect

"There may be times when we are powerless to prevent injustice, but there must never be a time when we fail to protest." Elie Wiesel (Holocaust survivor)

Winnipeg CWL Provincial Council hosted over 600 delegates to the 98th CWL National Convention August 11-15th, 2018. What a wonderful hospitable group of women who greeted us with their smiles, hugs and generous hospitality.

Most delegates arrived on Saturday and we were no exception. Registration went smoothly, then a trip around the facilities to get the lay of the land and prepare for our first excursion to the Human Rights Museum. It was a journey through time as we read, listened and thought about the development of our rights and the lack there of when power corrupts and absolute power corrupts absolutely. There were many writings on the walls and the one that spoke to me as a woman and a CWL member is at the top of this report. This reflects are story as we work hard for the rights of the people in our country. Often we are not successful but we are faithful to our mission to be of service.



I thought of all the letters we have written and visits that we have made only to have the door closed on us but the door slammers know that we are vigilant and we are a voice for the most vulnerable.

Sunday afternoon August 12th called us to the resolutions dialogue with many other delegates from across the country to discuss the resolutions that would come to the business meeting. It gave us another opportunity to meet new women with whom we have a common bond.

Following the dialogue we hopped on buses to St. Boniface Cathedral for the Opening Eucharistic Celebration, Opening Ceremonies and Reception. Alberta Mackenzie processed two flags, Alberta and NWT, and it was my honour to process the North West Territories Flag. There is a true sense of community as all the smiling faces greet you and you realize what an amazing group of faith filled women we are from sea to sea to sea. Margaret Ann Jacobs, National President declared the convention open and the reception that followed was wonderful with great food and members getting to know each other.

The next morning, Monday the 13th came early as we had Mass at 8 am followed by the business meeting at 9:15. Margaret Ann Jacobs began the meeting with acknowledging the peoples and lands of Treaty One. We listened to greetings from the following women's organizations: World Union of Catholic Women Organization (WUCWO), Ukraine Catholic Women's Organization, Presbyterian Women's Missionary Society, United Church Women Manitoba and NWT and Women's Inter-church Councils of Canada.

Then on to business with the usual presenting of agenda, minutes, roll call, etc. Following that we heard from the Military Ordinariate and Provincial Presidents as they shared the stories of their provinces.

The reports of the national officers followed. The resolutions mentioned earlier were discussed under the individual officer's report. Each resolution had much discussion with amendments being made, voted on, accepted or rejected until the assembly felt they had the best product. The final results will be in the League magazine.

A question arose about Development and Peace. Bishop McGrattan shared that an in depth evaluation of the partners of D&P is being conducted by the CCCB and once that is completed the funds collected will be dispersed either back to councils or forwarded to D&P. Other Funds collected and disbursed were as follows Canadian Missions \$37,039.38 Euthanasia Prevention Coalition \$19,702.00 Development and Peace \$63,220.90 (On hold) CNEWA \$16,097.85 Coady Institute \$27,719.82

The day ended with the New Life Members service. As a participant in the service it felt very sacramental. The Bishop blessed our hands for service and we signed ourselves with the Holy Water. As the honorary life members held their hands over us we could feel the history of our League and as the membership sang the blessing song we knew and felt the presence of God.



Tuesday, August 14th was workshop day. The morning began with Mass at the St. Mary's Cathedral followed by participating in two of six workshop. The two workshops I attended were Indigenous Issues where members were called to participate in an Indigenous Food Security Blanket Exercise and Homelessness where we had a presentation on a homeless shelter in Winnipeg and how they work at meeting the needs of their clients. Each workshop was ninety minutes long and the Indigenous Issues workshop because it was a three hour workshop squashed into ninety minutes a lot of the experience and information was lost.

Our keynote speaker in the afternoon was Archbishop Murray Chatlain, Archbishop of Keewatin-Le Pas, Manitoba. He presented twice. The first presentation was about reconciliation and the second on discerning what God wants from us. In the first presentation he asked: "What does reconciliation look like?"

He then proposed three principles that guide the process:

- We are all part of a common humanity
- We all have the capacity to evolve and change
- We all yearn for unity and peace

He then outlined the steps in the process

- 1. We need to let go of our need to be right
- 2. We have heartfelt hope that the other will find healing
 We pray for the other > We desire to understand the other > Knowledge is the first step in reconciliation
- 3. We need to be open about recognizing our own darkness

 There is saint and sinner in each of us > Running from dark emotions is what sinks us
- 4. Patience

We need sacred spaces where we are being urged to stand still > We need to create spaces of true dialogue

He then posed the question: How can the work of reconciliation apply to us?

To help us with our answer he gave us the following questions which we discussed at our tables

- What fears and prejudices are in us that hold us back from real dialogue?
- Who could you call on to teach you more about the issues?
- What event could you attend to help you grow in your knowledge of the issues?
- What is one practical step that you can make towards greater reconciliation?

Discernment - listening to God to hear what he wants of us was the focus of his second talk. He shared with us the process he uses for himself when needing to make decisions and choices. His process is rooted in Ignatian spirituality.





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He suggested to hear God we must **listen slowly.** We must actively work at this.

Our ears need to be at God's mouth. In other words we need to read scripture for that's where God uses words. We need to use our gift of intelligence. We need to seek out information, make a list of ideas, consult with people that know us and then make a list of three options. We then bring those options to God and repeat them three times very slowly. Within this we are given the gift of uncertainty as uncertainty keeps us praying to God. The following is what God says to us when we go to Him:

> Let go of all things that dishonor him. Let go of our attachments. Wait. Don't rush into anything.

God tells us all will be well.

Wednesday August 15th we continued with our business meeting which included a presentation on the strategic plan. We learned the gathering of information is over; goals, objectives and a timeline have been set. An implementation team will be formed to get everything moving forward

Velma Harrison, Past Honorary Life member gave a report from WUWCO as their representative had a heart attack and was unable to attend. Rita James gave us a report on the Leadership Foundation. Bishop McGrattan gave his final report and reminded us to stay the course. He then introduced Bishop Jensen the new national spiritual advisor.

Ann Gorman presented the theme for 2019-2020 "Care for our Common Home". Credentials were presented with a grand total of 683 people attending convention.

We had great representation from Alberta and the North West Territories. We were 75 strong at our Alberta-NWT Provincial Dinner Tuesday night. The roll out of the 2019 National Convention on Wednesday had almost all of the 75 participate. The parliamentarian Becky Kallal and guest journalist Cathy Bouchard were both Alberta life members.

Meeting was adjourned following the elections. We headed to St. Mary's Cathedral for the Closing Mass and retiring of flags and all enjoyed the Gala Banquet

Archbishop Albert LeGatt presided over a beautiful opening Eucharistic celebration held at St. Boniface Cathedral on August 12th. The Archbishop, using humour, welcomed everyone to Friendly Manitoba and Winnipeg not Winterpeg! He used his homily to teach us about the beauty of Manitoba and its rich history. The Church is celebrating the 200th Anniversary of the arrival of the first two Catholic priests and one seminarian sent from Quebec. The clergy came at the invitation of the Métis and Lord Selkirk. This Scottish Lord, a protestant, also invited the Anglicans to come - early ecumenism. Archbishop LeGatt spoke about how the women came and helped. The CWL continues to do that with their faith. Archbishop LeGatt recognizes that the CWL faces challenges with declining membership and the reluctance of members to take on leadership roles. The CWL is the voice of the feminine genius and we will continue to be that voice through our work, welcoming diversity and inclusiveness.

Our Monday morning Mass was offered by National Spiritual Advisor, Bishop William McGrattan. In his homily he helped us to reflect on how Christ is always with us – even when we aren't with Him. God has chosen to recreate us through the Eucharist, a moment of transcendence and a gift of God's presence and the gift of one another – he has chosen to walk among us. He spoke of the power of the CWL when we gather; we lift up, transforming power in the love of God. The liturgy unites us.

At the Monday afternoon closing prayer, we celebrated the commissioning of new Life Members with Bishop McGrattan blessing the hands of the new Life members and the work they will continue to do for the League.

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
Diocesan Council Updates

"Welcome to the Roman Catholic Diocese of Calgary. Established in 1912, our diocese stretches 110,000 square kilometers, spread across southern Alberta. Comprised of over 400,000 Catholics, 68 parishes and 11 missions, the diocese is led by Bishop William T. McGrattan.

The history of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Calgary is one of growth, change, immigration, adaptation and hope.





We were fortunate to have two councils activate in the past year, but we also had two councils close. The Catch the Fire workshop continues to be offered and councils are willing to have it presented at their parishes. Two councils have been granted the Father Walter Krewski awards this year (for 2017 memberships) and the Diocesan Officers continue to answer questions regarding memberships and taking on leadership roles.

Councils continue to reward their members with years of service pins, Maple Leaf pins and other gifts of appreciation. Sacred Heart CWL Council in Strathmore has awarded the Belle Guerin Pin to a member and the Provincial Council awarded the Elsie Yanik award to a member of the St. Martha's CWL, Lethbridge.

The Fall Meeting and Workshops will take place on September 22, 2018 at St. George's, Hanna, Alberta. At this meeting we will have a Leadership Workshop by Dorothy Johansen, Life Member from the Edmonton Diocese. Along with that each individual chair will have a workshop session to discuss with attendees what each chair involves.

National 2019 Planning Committee – has been hard at work and now we are into the final months of preparation to welcoming sisters, clergy and guests from across Canada next August. I was very pleased with the presentation given by the committee and with the many extra CWL members from Alberta Mackenzie that helped with the presentation. Alberta and the Diocese of Calgary will truly be represented.

Alberta Mackenzie was well represented at the National Convention in Winnipeg this past August.

The Calgary Diocesan Council will continue to encourage our members to work on resolutions passed at National this year and in years past. Mental Health and Pornography postcards will continue to be purchased and sent to all levels of members of parliaments.

RENEWAL THROUGH OUR ARCHIVES ST. JOSEPH COUNCIL FORT SMITH 2018



In the summer of 2017, the St. Joseph's CWL council appeared to be non-existent. Many women had stopped being active members and several of the key executive members had left the community. But that did not stop the nucleus of women determined to spread the faith through the sisterhood of the CWL. They knocked on around 100 doors inviting women for tea and fellowship.

By January 2018 a new executive was established through many prayers, reflection and hard work. At present, the council holds 14 members (from a 30-year-old new Mom to age 80+) and they have bravely forged ahead to invite our diocese to hold our annual convention in their community on Feb. 28!

While reflecting and searching for Divine guidance in their journey, the sisters were inspired to go through the many boxes stored in the back of the choir loft of their cathedral. (The St. Joseph's Cathedral will be celebrating its 60th anniversary in 2019 and was originally designated as the Diocesan Centre before Yellowknife became the capital.) What they found was so astounding that they have decided to build a museum in the left entrance of the cathedral. They found 60 beautiful tabernacle covers, numerous chalices, vestments, many, many pounds of beautiful lace (from France), and much more. There were even boxes filled with materials from early missions which had closed. With the support of our Bishop the ladies kept what they felt they could use and sent the rest to our archives in Yellowknife. The women have developed an information flyer which is available at the village historical centre and through that offer tours of the cathedral three afternoons per week. Some women are presently sewing beautiful seat covers with the lace for the elders attending mass. Another group is interviewing elders and will produce a booklet filled with stories of the early missionaries.





The St. Joseph council in Fort Smith was once a group of women who held the village's annual fall fair and raised funds for charities. Now they are sisters united in bringing people back to their church and dedicated to growing in their faith. This fall at their meetings they plan to study Bishop Robert Barron's series entitled "The Mass".

In June, several of our members attended the Convention in Okotoks and in August we had one member attend the National Convention in Winnipeg.


