It has been a busy autumn for ABMK members as we continued Unity Plan Visits, participated in virtual and in-person Retreats, Fall Meetings, workshops and planned the Alberta Mackenzie CWL & St. Vincent de Paul Society Initiative to *Help Feed the North*. As Unity Plan Visits wind down, we thank you for your participation in the *National Unity Plan* visits to address the future needs of the League. Membership continues to be a concern for our councils and we are reminded that if each one of us were to invite and support one Catholic woman in joining the League, our membership would double. ABMK hosted a compelling virtual retreat entitled *Walking Together as People of Faith* on October 1st with Father Christino Bouvette from the Diocese of Calgary. We were joined by CWL members from across the country who were grateful for the opportunity to hear Fr. Cristino speak. In January we begin the New National Theme: *Here I Am Lord; Send Me.* More info follows.

Councils are encouraged to start their membership drives to encourage renewals and recruit new members.

Check out the New "1" Campaign designed to **Recruit:** encourage members to invite women in their parish and community to joint the League. **Retain:** Show gratitude and appreciation to current members. **Regain:** Welcome members or councils back to the sisterhood.

Memberships should be submitted to National by the end of February. For ideas to use in your membership efforts, please check the National website. Be sure to apply for the Fr. Walter Krewski Awards by the end of February. The form is found on the ABMK website.

2023 is an Election Year for all three levels of the League in Alberta Mackenzie. Encourage your members to consider serving on an executive. Membership on an executive is a wonderful way to learn, grow in faith and foster relationships with your League sisters while bringing forward new ideas and serving your council. A new Executive Handbook is available on the National website located under manuals with information to help you in discerning. Inspired by the Holy Spirit, CWL Members Live out their Profound Calling to Care.

In mid September, an idea was born at our ABMK Executive Fall Meeting to provide aid to northern communities coping with the devastation of wildfires through a large donation of basic food items that are expensive & in short supply which include flour, sugar, baking powder, salt, peanut butter, baking soda, etc.

We approached Archbishop Richard Smith who supported our proposal but suggested that we contact Bishop Jon Hansen of the NWT and St. Vincent de Paul for their views. Both were onboard and SVDP suggested that we partner on the initiative which was such a blessing as we learned that the success of such initiatives relies heavily on connections which they have developed thru time. Bishop Jon suggested that our donation be given to Hay River & Fort Smith who are in especially dire need. When approached, *Manitoulin Trucking* agreed to ship two sea cans of food to the two communities without charge (\$4,000.00 donation). *Freson Bros.* agreed to a discount on the food (\$3,200.00). The sea cans, shelving and padlocks were purchased by SVDP (\$10,000.00). The sea cans are to remain in the two communities to provide future storage for their food banks. **Edmonton Catholic Schools** had agreed to paint the sea cans but due to the onset of cold weather were not able to do so.

Our ABMK Dioceses were onboard and began sharing the news of the initiative with councils throughout ABMK (excepting Mackenzie-Fort Smith who would receive the donation). Each CWL member was asked to donate \$5.00 and if possible, more. **The Archdiocese of Edmonton** contributed \$5,000.00, ABMK Provincial CWL Council (\$5,000.00) and other donations began to come in and at the end of this project over \$59,000.00 in donations of money and services will be gifted to the North. Money collected after the food shipment will be given to St. Vincent de Paul for their continuing work in the North. Our collective prayers, donations, goodwill, and intentional discipleship speaks to Isaiah 58:10 *If you give some of your own food to those who are hungry and to satisfy those who are humble, then your light will rise in the dark, and your darkness will become as bright as the noonday sun.*

Alberta Mackenzie Provincial CWL Awards

Elsie Yanik Award

The Elsie Yanik Award was created to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the Alberta Mackenzie Provincial Council in 1997. This award is to commemorate the ministry and service of Elsie Yanik to the Catholic community in the Diocese of Mackenzie Ft. Smith. This award will go to a CWL member in Alberta Mackenzie CWL who demonstrates the spirit of Elsie Yanik, a giving woman who shared her gifts and talents help those around her to grow in their faith and serve their community. Candidates for this award should reflect that spirit of faith and service. Guidelines and criteria as well as the nomination form are available on the ABMK Provincial website: abmkcwl.ca. *The deadline to apply for this award is February 15.*

Father Walter Krewski Award

This award is named for long time Spiritual Advisor of the ABMK Provincial Council. The purpose of these awards is to recognize councils who have made an effort to increase their memberships in the previous year. The awards are for the highest increase in new (never been a member) members; the greatest percentage of members and the greatest increase in members. Councils can apply for one or all of the categories if their numbers fit the criteria. Even if your council only gains one or two new members, you should apply. Sometimes, all it takes is one new member to increase the percentage of members! *The deadline to apply for these awards is February 28*. By now most of our councils will be using the new format for council executives. This time will be a learning curve for us. How do we incorporate all of the committees we used to have into just three? It will take time to sort out where our individual council projects fit under the new structure. Don't be discouraged. We are all in the same boat. Christ will calm the waters for us. Trust that you have been given the gifts and talents you need to do it.

In this article, I will focus on recruiting. In January, we'll begin our annual recruiting period, but recruiting all the time is a good thing. So, where to start? We have three pillars, faith, social justice and service. Does your council focus on one of these pillars more than the others? If so, why not start there. What are your members most interested in? Is it faith enrichment? How about creating resolutions? Do your members spend a lot of time helping the less fortunate? Maybe you work on all three pillars equally. Once you figure this out, then you can begin to determine what methods of recruiting will best fit your council and you can tailor your message to the women in your parish. Decide on what you want your council to be.

The next step involves finding the right tools for you to use. The League has a multitude of resources to help you out. You don't have to make it up all on your own. We've probably all used the parish bulletin to advertise The League and invite ladies to join us. Then there is the personal invitation which can be very fruitful. Have you tried any of the new tools and resources from our national website: The Catholic Women's League of Canada (cwl.ca) We don't have to re-invent the wheel. National Office has done that for us!

You can download the short videos from the website to a memory stick and play them in your parish before Mass begins (with permission from your parish priest). The videos are short and inspiring. Share them on your parish Facebook page. Print off pamphlets (#313 is a good one) from the website and place them in the pews and have some available wherever your parish has other information brochures. Wear your scarves pins and t-shirts if you have them, when you serve at Mass. If you have a member receiving a significant milestone pin, present it at Mass. Create a weekly or monthly article for your parish bulletin detailing what you are doing as a council.

These are just a few suggestions for you to consider. One thing is certain, if we don't take some action, CWL membership numbers will continue to decrease. The worst that can happen when inviting someone to join this marvelous organization is that someone will say "No". That's ok. Continue working on it. Look for the ladies in your parish who are young and computer literate, the ones who volunteer in your community. Tell them about our work for God and Canada. Don't forget to pray about it too!

Not only was it educational, but we had a lot of fun while we were learning. Our thanks to St. Bonaventure council who made sure we didn't go hungry by providing us with refreshments and lunch both days. The workshop was attended new members within the last few years, members who would soon be council presidents, regional chairs, council presidents, members on diocesan council, as well as ABMK council and life members. After thanking Todd for spending two days with us, he received our traditional "Blessing Song". I thoroughly recommend Todd as a facilitator if anyone would like to host a Parliamentarian Workshop.

My dear sisters in the League,

It is hard to believe that we are already in the Fall Season, the leaves have yellowed and fallen to the ground, our gardens have been cleaned and we've had a taste of the cold temperatures and snow.

Our Mid-winter and fall meetings were held at the Star of the North Retreat House in St. Albert and as usual successful and a lot of information was shared. In June, the Provincial Convention was held at Corpus Christi Parish. The opening Mass was held at the Sacred Heart Church of the First Peoples and a reception was held in their hall. Buses were hired to take us to and from the opening Mass. It was a very good convention, great venue, speakers and food was enjoyed by all and our costs came in within budget.

At our convention concerns were voiced about the lack of ability to e-transfer funds to the ABMK CWL Provincial account. After our Fall meeting, with all approvals in place, INTERACT e-transfers became a reality.



The 2024 Convention Planning Committee held their first meeting at the Ascension Parish in Northwest Calgary on September 28th. Our next meeting will be held via Zoom.

At the Fall meeting we were made aware of the needs of the North for basic food supplies such as flour, sugar baking powder etc. With the forest fires in the North, evacuations and the need to feed the fire fighters, basic supplies became impossible to get and very expensive. The proposal that was made by our president was that if each CWL member were to donate the equivalent of the purchase of a cup of coffee approximately \$5.00 each, we could raise \$40,000.00. At that meeting the Provincial Council made a motion to donate \$5,000.00 towards this worthy cause. So with the help of St. Vincent de Paul and with the generous donations of many, two sea cans of food will be shipped North, one to Hay River and one to Ft. Smith.

Thinking back to our CWL roots, wasn't that what Kathryn Hughes was all about....a women of action. It's amazing what can happen when we pool together.

As we are getting closer to the end of the year, we need to look at all the good works we have done during the year and report on them. Part of the reporting process also includes the financial aspect of our Council's work. The Voluntary Fund Disbursement form can be found at: cwl.ca > resources > forms > #513 or 513F. The Voluntary Fund Disbursement form is sent to the CWL National Office. If your Council is making a donation towards Alberta March for Life and/or Nickel's for the North, please have your remittance into the treasurer by mid-December so the funds can be disbursed of before year end.

At the provincial convention in June in Edmonton I presented a workshop that was entitled Change is Here/Embrace It/ Love it. Lobbying for an Independent Seniors' Advocate

Keeping in mind our core values of faith, service and social justice, we are encouraging every member of the Alberta Mackenzie Provincial council to contact her local MLA regardless of their political affiliation. This contact could be through a letter, an e-mail, a phone call, or an in-person meeting in outlining the need for an independent seniors' advocate - an independent officer of the legislature. All Alberta political parties need to be aware of our concerns. We are also encouraging our members to ask their neighbours and friends who are not members of the CWL to support this initiative by contacting their MLA.

Although we are CWL members we are speaking as private citizens and not as CWL members. Any official contact with government will be made by the Provincial President.

A sample letter available on the website can be used to help formulate your letter The Alberta Provincial Council hopes to meet with the Alberta government in the spring of 2024, so we ask that you to contact your MLA no later than February 28, 2024.

Your participation in this campaign is crucial as the government needs to hear from as many Albertans as possible to communicate our wishes regarding seniors' issues and concerns.

This past year was a transitional year for many councils in our province. Some councils maintained a Community Life Chair, while others adopted the new Service Standing Committee format. As you know, the provincial council adopted the new structure and at the National Annual Meeting of Members in August the new structure was adopted.

Navigating the various activities of the Service Committee, there are several resources on the national cwl website that can assist with the adopting the duties of the Service Standing Committee. I draw your attention to two documents in particular on the national website: "The Joy of Leadership – Module 1: Ministries" (835/835a) and "Toolkit for Service" (637). Service embraces the works of mercy from Matthew 25:35-36:

"For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and your welcomed me, I was naked and you gave me clothing, I was sick and you took care of me, I was in prison and you visited me."

Pope Francis' instruction on September 1st, 2016, added care of creation to the traditional set of works of mercy.

Service also includes catholic education, literacy, bursaries, and scholarships. Councils should have no difficulty adjusting to the Service Standing Committee.

The focus for the coming year will be on to help the hungry and homeless, assisting those who have been affected by floods and forest fires, walking with our sisters and brothers on a journey to heal and rebuild the broken legacy of the past, and supporting our catholic schools. Over the coming months, information and activities will be developed and forwarded to each diocese to help parishes with information and suggestions to implement.

Joline Belliveau, National Chairperson of Service in her second communique, reminds us that monthly meetings need not always be held at the same time, on the same day or place. Councils could consider scheduling an activity of service instead of their monthly meeting, or scheduling a meeting at a senior's home, or a homeless shelter to highlight one of projects or groups your council supports.

The 3rd National Truth and Reconciliation Day was celebrated on September 30th. Many councils found various ways to mark this national day. Continue to encourage members to become aware of the calls to action of the TRC. They can be found at www.reconciliation.ca or reflect on one of the homilies and speeches by Pope Francis on his Penitential Journey Pilgrimage in Canada in July 2022. His words are available in "Walking Together", published by the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops.

Councils across Alberta supported Catholic Education Sunday on November 5th through praying the Novena for Catholic Education or using the Mass Intentions. If your council isn't connected to GrACE (Grateful Advocates for Catholic Education), you are encouraged to contact them at contact the Executive Director at gracedirector?@gmail.com.

I conclude with a renewed sense of purpose for the coming year. "Rescue the weak and the needy, deliver them from the hands of the wicked" Psalm 82:4.

What an amazing virtual retreat we were blessed with on October 1st, facilitated by Rev. Father Cristino Bouvette a young Calgary diocesan priest of Metis background who opened our hearts to the true meaning of reconciliation. He was chosen to organize the liturgies for the Pope's visit, is Vicar for Vocations and Young Adults and most recently has become the pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Strathmore. He applauded us for having a retreat to reflect on the people who call the land home and the people who share the land with them. He shared his journey as a priest as he mentioned his work in different parishes and with young adults. We soon learned that his heart belonged to two special ladies who he credits with helping him become the man he is today; his Kokum his Cree grandmother who was a survivor of residential schools and his Nona his Italian grandmother who immigrated to Canada and survived all the struggles that come from being an immigrant. He began as all story tellers do with his personal story which included being a descendent of a Methodist minister. He shared that the commitment that the Roman Catholic Church has to Truth and Reconciliation comes from the Church's commitment to Jesus Christ and Jesus Christ is committed to walking with our neighbour both in joy and in suffering. His Kokum and Italian grandmother were witnesses to the look of healing and reconciliation. He shared that when his Nona's husband passed away his Kokum who had lost her husband years before came to the funeral. She travelled to Medicine Hat a very long bus ride from her farm for the funeral. When she walked into the Church she went up and hugged his Nona and Nona said to Kokum "You know". Two very different women raised in different cultures both overcoming much prejudice came together and embraced. That is what walking in friendship looks like; to be with each other in pain and in joy. He shared that no amount of retribution will bring about reconciliation only the walking together as friends. Knowing the other's pain and working through it together allows healing. We must get over the fear that prevents us from interacting with our indigenous brothers and sisters. Shared friendship doubles our joy and divides our sorrows. He challenged us to think about the meaning of truth and who decides it's meaning. Jesus said I am the Way. the Truth and the Life. It doesn't matter how many orange shirts we wear; how many days are set aside, or how much money will be spent the only thing that will bring about healing and reconciliation is a change of heart, a heart that is open to transformation and is willing to reach out in friendship. It was a great afternoon an afternoon of laughter and some tears as we checked into on our own hearts and began feeling a tug saying, "I need you to reach out, see your neighbor as friend, work at this friendship and be healed."

Walking Together as People of Faith

For a most interesting, inspiring, and compelling presentation.

Question: We seek your comments and sage advice in responding to the email we received from a CWL member in Ontario who attended the virtual retreat on Sunday. Concerns about Land Acknowledgements have also been raised by CWL members in Alberta. Any direction you are willing to provide would be greatly appreciated.

Response from Father Cristino: There is a lot of mixed reaction to the practice of making land acknowledgements. They are admittedly one of the calls to action of the TRC, but we should be careful to remember that the calls to action are not automatically infallible expectations. I have personal apprehensions about their use. When you repeat something over and over again, it can diminish the meaning as people just become desensitized to hearing them.

However, when they are going to be used- and there are plenty of good and reasonable moments to do so I think the lady who commented below is right in recognizing that we should be acknowledging all land as coming from the Creator even before belonging to a traditional group of people. And that is in keeping how Indigenous people would acknowledge this too. So if the CWL are going to use these consistently in the future, I would simply encourage you to have them begin with something like "We acknowledge that we are on land which is the gift of the Creator, traditionally inhabited by..."

I hope this is helpful. Thank you again for inviting me at the beginning of this month and God bless your ongoing efforts!

Sanctity of Life: Euthanasia and Mental Health Submitted by Jan Myhre & Lia

IMPORTANT CALL TO ACTION:

On February 2, 2023, the Government of Canada introduced legislation (**Bill C-39**) announcing plans to delay MAiD eligibility for people whose sole underlying medical condition is a mental illness until **March 17**, **2024.** This is a one-year delay from the original timeline. They said that this delay will provide them with more time to develop practice standards and training, and to allow for better data collection and sharing.

In anticipation of a Bill being reintroduced in the Spring of 2024, **MAiD Postcards** will be available thru National Office in the next few weeks for mailing to our Members of Parliament. Postage will not be required on your postcards and letters as they are being sent to Members of Parliament.

Let your voice be heard on this critical **Sanctity of Life** issue.

Information will be available on the ABMK website.

The accelerated adoption of the Euthanasia law in Canada has thrown us into a troubling attack on the sanctity of life. Initially introduced by the Canadian Government to alleviate severe physical suffering, the law is now being suggested as a method to manage mental health conditions.

Bill C-7, an amendment to the Criminal Code relating to medical assistance in dying (MAiD), proposes expanding eligibility for MAiD by removing the requirement that for a Person seeking assistance; natural death must be reasonably foreseeable. This could allow individuals not nearing the end of their lives, including those with mental illnesses such as depression, to avail themselves of this provision.

Since its adoption, over 31,000 medically assisted suicides have occurred in Canada; a number projected to rise significantly with the planned expansion of the law to include those suffering from mental health conditions. However, mental health illnesses are highly treatable. Symptoms can be managed, and lives can be lived to the fullest. Broadening access to MAiD is not the solution, particularly when our priority should be to choose life over death. We must ensure all efforts are taken to protect the most vulnerable from medically assisted premature death, which can be prevented with adequate treatment and care. We should ensure that those suffering from mental illness are treated medically, not through assisted dying.

As the CCCB urges all the faithful in their Open Letter 2 in May 2023: "We encourage individual Catholics and their families, faith communities, Catholic healthcare professionals and any other people of good will to continue courageously and unwaveringly to witness to life, to tend to and accompany the sick, to resist pressure to support or participate in 'MAiD,' and to pray that our law makers may see the harm in what they are permitting to take place." Let us continue to pray for those living with mental health challenges and illnesses and those who care for them, that God may strengthen them in hope, and that they may find the support they need from family, healthcare professionals, faith communities, and others.



CWL National Theme 2024 & 2025


